

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Coral

Class Name - Coral

The name, *Coral*, has nothing to do with the type of art and design we will be creating. We have adopted the practice of identifying each diploma class by the name of a precious stone. This helps to create a visual identity for each class.

Course Duration

The course syllabus is delivered in eight sessions over two years, beginning December 2, 2015. There are approximately 271 instructional hours taken over 41 days.

Prerequisites: A potential student must have completed Level 3 Studies in Art and Design.

The Instructor

Gail Harker, LCGI, is a Canadian who resided for nearly 20 years in Britain, until returning to the US in 1995. She moved to Britain in 1976 with her American husband and family. She studied art in Canada, England and Scotland. She completed both Parts 1 and 2 (Diploma) of the City and Guilds Design and Embroidery course with *Distinction* in both parts. She was awarded the Senior Qualification of Licentiateship (LCGI) by the City and Guilds Institute. Gail has previously been a teacher of several City and Guilds Embroidery courses, and was, for several years, a City and Guilds External Verifier for various colleges in Great Britain. She has authored five books: *Embroidery Skills: Machine Embroidery* (published internationally in five languages), *Fairy Tale Quilts and Embroidery, Christmas Stitches, Creative Machine Embroi-*



dery and Tassel Making. She is a contributing author to: Starting to Stitch Creatively (Batsford - London) wherein she authored the section on Materials, and authored the Machine Embroidery chapters of the Merehurst Book of Needlework. Since moving to the United States she has taught over 30 Certificate and Diploma Classes in Design and Embroidery to students from all parts of North America. Gail is a highly sought after instructor and lecturer.

Coral Course Schedule at a Glance

Sessions 2 through 7 will have a Tutorial Day at the beginning of each session. This day will not be used for teaching, as such, but is devoted to a one-on-one tutorial with student and tutor. The Major Project - Research a Theme

The course provides students an opportunity to choose, research, explore, experiment, document and develop a major inspirational theme. A professional body of artwork will flow from the research of the theme. Students will be encouraged to develop their own innovative and inventive design ideas. Personal expression and more complex imagery will come from new techniques learned in the course along with those from *Level 3 Art and Design*. The following is an outline:

Select an Inspirational Theme

The theme should have many different aspects to it and should maintain personal interest for the duration of the course.

The Elements of Art

The theme should be broad in scope (at the beginning) to incorporate many aspects for further design possibilities. Ideally the theme should contain many of the Visual Components of Art (Line, Shape, Color, Value, Texture and Pattern.) The theme needs to have a primary source that can be visited at least once to sketch or photograph material together with sufficient secondary sources for reference. (libraries, internet, photos or films etc.)

Discuss and Agree

Communicate the theme idea/ideas to tutor for discussion to ensure that it has potential for a successful project.

Plan, Organize and Document

This will apply to all the many aspects of the research.

Research Methods

Research the theme using a number of different design methods and media used in *Level 3 Studies in Art and Design*, in addition to those studied in *Level 4 - Experimental Research for Advanced Design*. Students will make and retain their own comprehensive notes and records throughout the course.

Contemporary Design

Some of the subject matter of the theme will be used throughout the course to create a portfolio of ongoing sketchbooks, handmade books, loose designs, design and story boards, 3 – D and other art pieces. Some of the work will consist of exploratory studies while others will be more resolved designs.

Innovational Presentations

Students will select from their own body of artwork and display it in a visually appropriate presentation in the form of a handmade book, set of story boards, or some other innovational form.

Summarize and Evaluate

Students will be expected to evaluate and summarize their own project in approximately 500 to 700 words. A bibliography and research resources will be listed along with student notes, plans and records as a backup to the project.

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Assessments

- 1. The Major Project Research a Theme
- Exploratory and resolved contemporary design work in sketchbooks, handmade books, loose designs, 3-D design and story boards.
- Choice of Presentation in the form of a handmade book, set of story boards or other.
- 2. The Minor Project Historic Art Theme from British Embroidery for embroidery students or another appropriate theme if you are a design student
- 3. Independent Historical Embroidery Study chosen from a country other than Great Britain that has a long rich tradition in embroidery. This study will be short and focus on the collection of pictures of embroidered designs and motifs.

Tutorials

Ongoing and individual tutorials

The Minor Project - Historic Art Theme from British Embroidery

A Study will be undertaken to better understand development of design, pattern, motif, style and embroidery throughout the centuries for embroidery students.

British Historic Embroidery

- No other country has documented its rich heritage in Embroidery as have the British. By working chronologically through this study, it will be apparent how stitches, techniques, design styles, motifs, and patterns change and how embroidery was influenced by the everchanging culture.
- Embroidery students will collect and compile photos from Embroidery Periods from 8th C. to the 21C.
- Drawings from a select period will be done.
- There are detailed guidelines for this study.
- The main focus is on the compiling of information, photos and drawings. A few small embroidery stitches and techniques may be worked if you are an embroidery student.
- A formal presentation of one time period will be created
- Non embroidery students may select another art theme for their study and presentation.

A Portfolio of Mixed Media Samples and Studies

- A wide variety of materials handmade and purchased papers and fabrics,
- recycled and found objects will be utilized in workshops to expand and further develop students design vocabulary and imaginative skills.
- Unique construction methods will be explored.

Extended General Design

- Color theory
- The elements of design
- Sketchbook studies
- Research theme guidance
- Page presentation and layouts for handmade books

Manipulation on Paper and Fabric

 Patterns will be explored by using a variety of rolled, folded, pleated, twisted, crumpled, tied, and clamped methods with the use of dye and paints.

Printmaking

- A number of different methods will be employed to extend knowledge and to gain more complexity in the type of printmaking.
- Color mixing with inks and other mediums will be used to increase awareness of exciting color possibilities in printmaking.
- Design specifically for a large hand made rubber print block.

Collographs

- Collographs will be created using a Proofing Press.
- A Collograph is a print made from a raised surface on heavy board.

Collage

 More complex collage will be undertaken using your theme.

Laminated Papers, Fiber and Recycled Material

- Create laminated papers by fusing and gluing papers and fibers.
- Use glues, mediums and other inclusions to make unique personalized paper/fiber.

Dimensional Items and 3 D Forms

- Sculptural Collage will be done.
- Low and high relief forms will be created.
- Books, boxes and vessels will be investigated.
- Use construction methods for joining and binding

Still Life with a Difference

- How and why you should create a still life?
- Draw with a variety of medium to express simple ideas.
- Use scissors and torn paper to explore a still life.
- Free up your ideas about this playful activity.

Work in large scale for one project.

Total Tuition Cost - \$4275 (US Dollars)

Classroom materials may be used for working sampling ideas in the classroom, but not for projects at home.

Travel, Food, and Accommodation - Students will be individually responsible for all associated costs and expenses such as: travel, accommodation, meals, etc. 90 days prior to the course start date, we will contact you via e-mail to confirm the class. Please do not confirm travel arrangements until you have heard from us.
